Ladder Safety

To avoid falls while using a ladder, take the following steps.

1. **Inspect your ladder before each use.** Inspect rails, rungs, feet and spreaders. If damage is found,

spreaders. If damage is found, tag the ladder "do not use" and use another ladder.

- 2. **Position your ladder properly.** It must be at least 10 feet from power lines. Make sure you have level, solid footing for your ladder. Position your ladder close to your work to avoid overreaching. For extension ladders, position the ladder one foot away from the building for every 4 feet of height. Tie off the ladder at the top and bottom where possible.
- 3. Use the ladder safely. Maintain 3 point contact with the ladder at all times. When you are over the 4th step (4 feet off the ground) you must be 100% tied off.
